Pride Month – Events

Stonewall

The Stonewall Inn was a refuge for the people of the LGBTQ+ community there. During the early hours of June 28, 1969 Stonewall Inn was raided by the police under the pretext of them selling alcohol without a license but they also arrested people who weren't wearing at least three pieces of clothing that matched their gender according to a New York law. Instead of running away and scattering the onlookers enraged by the scene before them started to yell at the police and throw things at the nine men. The police retreated into the bar called reinforcements and built fortifications. The protesters managed to break the fortifications and the inn caught on fire. Reinforcements came and extinguished the fire and dispersed the 400 strong crowd. Over the following 5 days there were many more riots and protests. This event help jolt the nation awake to the injustice that the LGBTQ+ community faced and it was a catalyst for future activists. The site later became a national monument.

The invention of the rainbow flag

Gilbert Baker made the rainbow flag for San Francisco's gay freedom day. Philadelphia added black and brown to the flag. 'There is a mile long version of the flag that is used for the New York pride parade. The flag has become a symbol of LGBTQ+ pride around the world.

Black Pride

In 1991 activists Welmore Cook, Theodore Kirkland and Ernest Hopkins organized the first DC Black Pride march. It started with 800 people and now more than 300,000 attend every year on memorial day. DC Black Pride inspired the other black pride movements throughout the country.

Marrige Equality

On June 26, 2015 the supreme court ruled that same sex marriage was legal in Obergefell v. Hodges. It was a time to celebrate with parades and parties. There were thousands of supporters in DC.

AIDS Memorial Quilt

While the LGBTQ+ community was out of the shadows the HIV/Aids epidemic had plunged the community into crisis. So during the 1987 National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights a quilt was revealed that honored the people who died to the disease and reminding them about the deadly toll. The quilt was larger than a football field including 1,920 panels and was the biggest community art project in the world.
